Changes to the Bylaws and Constitution

We are required to state in our bylaws how our funds would be dispersed should NDMTA ever dissolve. In the February 1, 2014 meeting of the NDMTA board, the following change to the NDMTA bylaws was approved and is now officially a part of the NDMTA bylaws:

DISSOLUTION

In the event of the dissolution of the Association for any reason, funds or other assets of the Association remaining after settlement of the liabilities of the Association shall be contributed to the Music Teachers National Association Foundation, Inc. However, if such entity does not then qualify under Section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954, or is otherwise unable or unwilling to accept such distribution, the assets shall be distributed as the Executive Committee determines to one or more organizations which do qualify under said code.

The following change to the constitution addresses two concerns. First, it allows a new president to take office with an experienced treasurer (rather than both people being new to the positions). Second, it allows an experienced officer who is doing a good job to succeed herself/himself more than once, but also puts checks and balances into the process.

In the February 1, 2014 meeting of the NDMTA board, the board approved the following amendment to the Constitution, to be voted on at the meeting of the general membership during the June 2014 conference:

Article IV Officers

Section 3. All officers are elected for a term of two years. The Vice President (President-Elect), and Treasurer are is elected in even-numbered years and takes office with the new President. The Secretary and Treasurer are is elected in odd numbered years. No officer shall succeed herself/himself more than once unless approved in advance of the nomination by a quorum of the Executive Board.

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NDMTA Vice President Position

In June of 2012, I had the privilege of becoming the vice president of NDMTA. At that same time, Beth Klingenstein became our president of NDMTA. It is hard to believe that our two-year terms are going to expire at the state conference this June. The time has gone so fast and it has truly been an enjoyable experience. As many of you know, our organization has sometimes had difficulty finding members willing to become officers in NDMTA. Luckily, we have managed to have great presidents for NDMTA and we want to continue drawing from our excellent membership in order to fill these leadership positions. I want to thank all of our past presidents for their time and dedication to this wonderful organization!

I believe there are two main reasons that hold our members back from taking on the position of vice president and president. One is that the positions can be perceived as overwhelming and the other is that we feel too busy to dedicate the time needed for such positions. We are all busy people, probably more than most on this planet.

When Beth and I accepted our positions in 2012 it was with the agreement that the job descriptions for each position would be adjusted so that they would *not* be overwhelming. We too were fearful of the commitment. The vice president is no longer in charge of the MTNA state competitions. We want to thank Sue Nagel of Fargo for being the chairperson. This change allowed for the vice president to take on some of the responsibilities that the president once had, which helped the president's position to be less time consuming. Now, the vice president can be focused on just a few responsibilities and be a shadow to the president. This in turn makes the vice president feel more prepared for the presidency. It is more like teamwork than lone positions. That is what our organization is all about, working *together* for the betterment of our members and their students!

Beth and I feel everything has fallen into place quite nicely and it is now time to move new people into these positions. In June of 2014, I will become the next president for NDMTA. I need a vice president. I would like to have someone in place as soon as possible so that we can be ready for the transition in June. I invite you to consider this position. It is a wonderful opportunity! It will help me greatly to know that I can have someone willing to assist me on the board. Here is what the vice president will be expected to do:

- 1) Set up two executive board meetings in October and February using IVN, conference call, or some other form of group communication. There is a file explaining exactly how to set up the meetings.
- 2) Be the Commissioned Composer Chairman. This is an interesting process where you get to meet and work with composers who premier their compositions at the state conferences. Again, there is a detailed file and job description that makes the job very easy.
- 3) Be an assistant to the president, which is simply discussing matters that arise, by email or phone calls.

The vice president elect has a two-year term with the responsibilities listed above and then that person moves into the presidency for two years followed by the past president position for two years. Yes, that is a commitment but here are the benefits:

- 1) You will gain great experience in leadership.
- 2) You will learn how this organization runs from the bottom up and how it is connected to MTNA, the national organization.
- 3) As vice president you will receive \$1,000 to assist with travel, including attending the MTNA Conference!
- 4) As president you will receive \$2,000 to assist with travel, including attending the MTNA Conference!
- 5) It will give you a chance to give back to a group of musicians who have given so much to you be it through mentoring, workshops, conferences, competitions, etc.

Being a member of the executive board and holding an officer position is a privilege, that Beth and I have both accepted with pride. Being on the board and holding an office should be a goal for all of our members to keep NDMTA alive and progressing forward.

The NDMTA is excited to nominate Priscilla Keogh as our MTNA Foundation Fellow for 2015. We now need to start the fund raising process to meet the \$1000 necessary for her to be honored at the 2015 MTNA Conference.

Priscilla Keogh grew up in Drake, North Dakota, and knew by age 12 that she wanted to be a music teacher. She studied piano with Gerrit Vander Mei in Minot and continued her education at the University of North Dakota where she received a Bachelor of Science degree in music



education. Her first year of teaching was in a suburb of Washington, D.C. She married Robert Keogh and returned to the Midwest, eventually to Dickinson, ND, where their five children were raised.

As a member of MTNA, Priscilla was active in the Badlands MTA, and served on the NDMTA Board holding several offices including state president. Her students participated in Rallies, Federated Music Clubs Festivals, and the NDMTA and MTNA competitions. She has served as adjudicator at Festivals and competitions in North Dakota and Montana.

As a teacher, Priscilla has taught band, vocal and general music in public schools, and piano at Dickinson State University where she received the Adjunct Teacher of the Year award in 2004. She has been on the piano faculty of the International Music Camp and is currently conductor of the Dickinson City Band and Dickinson String Ensemble, music minister of St. Wenceslaus Catholic Church, and maintains a studio of piano and cello students.

Mary Sallee's Sessions for the North Dakota MTA Conference

There's No Harm in Harmonizing!

In this session, I will share how I get my students thinking harmonically (vertically) from the very beginning. I will demonstrate the exercises I have devised for my students (both pre-college and adult) to build their chordal vocabulary and become proficient at harmonizing/accompanying melodies. I will also show my step-by-step process of getting students to play from a lead sheet and create their own 2-hand accompaniments for songs or piano duets. My goal for them is to become comfortable with writing in their own chord symbols (and Roman numerals) as a 'short-hand' or 'cheat sheet' for learning their pieces in a quick and efficient manner.

This work with 'hands-on harmonizing' is easily transferred when they look at chords in their solo pieces. Pretty soon, their 'cheat sheet' becomes a helpful tool in learning their music more efficiently. They soon realize the harmonic plan of their elementary/intermediate piece is NOT rocket science! Not only do they understand their music at a deeper level, they also become much more secure and proficient at memorization.

Wheere's the Beat?

This session explores the *What, How, Where, When and Why* of counting. While such a topic might seem quite elementary (and boring), it is important to ask ourselves: *Are we teaching our students how to play with rhythmic integrity as well as how to manipulate time to play expressively?* In this session, I will explore how we can teach *musicality* by engaging the ear to develop rhythmic control and understanding.

We'll also explore some familiar passages in the intermediate literature. I'll show how we can teach our students to practice in a way that prevents the pitfalls where they practice in rhythmic idiosyncrasies. I'll focus on problem-solving and practice techniques that engage the ear (through counting and singing) so students can overcome common pitfalls and technical problems in rhythmic passages.

"My Favorite Things"

Like many, I have my fair share of unmotivated students (or even good students that fall into a slump). I think we're always on the lookout for the perfect piece that will make a particular student *want to practice* or develop in the area where they lack proficiency. Sometimes, we need a piece with limited technical challenges that will inspire them to quickly memorize the music and develop more expression or confidence in their tone. Other times, we want to inspire them to move to a new level by engaging their ear and imagination.

In this session, I'd like to share some music *that I have written* for my students that I feel has been successful at a variety of levels. Because I believe that all styles of music are important, I will cover a variety of arrangements that I have done including; pop, jazz, and ragtime styles. I'll also include simplified classical arrangements that I use with my adult hobby students so *they* can experience the classics. The majority of the session will showcase my original solos and duets that I have composed to challenge and capture my students' imagination. I'll share how I have written certain pieces to teach a particular concept or to develop confidence in a certain musical gesture or technique. After hearing and seeing most of my educational music, you will understand that I also enjoy writing vocal and choral music and incorporate lyrics into my piano music whenever possible. I hope to have most of my 50 publications on hand for teachers' perusal as I demonstrate snippets from my elementary, intermediate and advanced literature published by Alfred, FJH, Hal Leonard and Carl Fischer.

Teaching "Jazz 101" and Ragtime

In this session, I will demonstrate basic concepts when teaching jazz and ragtime styles. We'll cover jazz performance practice as it relates to many elements: harmony, rhythm, articulation, tempo, phrasing and form.

I often remind my students that playing in a jazzy/blues style may *sound easy* but it actually requires just as much technical proficiency and critical listening as it does to perform Mozart, if not more! We've all heard that this style can be forgiving in some ways: allowing wrong notes here and there, but one can NOT cheat (or fake it) when it comes to playing with sloppy rhythm or an unsteady tempo. Jazz requires the student to be proficient in their understanding of *all fundamentals*, including attention to articulation and harmonic structure (chord progressions). What better way to motivate your students to learn their cadences and chord progressions than to assign them a 12-bar blues?

As we discuss the technical and stylistic demands of playing jazz and ragtime, I'll focus on the most important element: playing with *rhythmic integrity*. I'll address how to prepare your students' ears (and fingers) for playing in both 'swing' as well as straight 8th feel/style. I'll also discuss the contrasting demands in performance practice for ragtime, specifically rags composed by Scott Joplin.

Mary Sallee is a Nationally Certified Teacher of Music and has run her own piano studio in Norman, Oklahoma since 1988. She holds a double Bachelor's Degree in piano performance and vocal music education as well as a Master's Degree in piano performance and pedagogy, all from the University of Oklahoma. After graduating, she studied at the Hochschule fur Musik in Vienna as a Rotary Ambassadorial Scholar. In 1987, she was one of six graduate students chosen to perform and teach at the National Conference on Piano Pedagogy.

As a composer, Mary writes a majority of the music used in her piano studio as well as vocal and choral music. She has over 60 publications with various publishers including Alfred, FJH, Carl Fischer and Willis/Hal Leonard. Over the years, several of her original pieces have made the Federated Music Teachers list. Mary is also a singer and church pianist and freelances as a guest conductor for various choirs including Windsong, a semi-professional chamber choir in which she sings. She enjoys composing for voice and piano and has been commissioned to write several choral works for churches, community choirs and arts organizations including the Oklahoma Music Teachers.

She specializes in teaching adults but also enjoys talking to teachers about music that she has composed to motivate *young* students. She has written several articles for Keyboard Companion and has presented pedagogical workshops in California, Ohio, Minnesota, Kansas, Nebraska, North Carolina, Texas and Oklahoma as well as the MTNA National Conference. She has taught piano at the International Music Camp in Manitoba, Canada and served on the adjunct piano faculty at Oklahoma Baptist University.

Mary is a versatile performer and enjoys freelancing as an accompanist, a classical duo performer and a dinner/jazz pianist. Her jazz group performs throughout the Oklahoma City metro and has been featured at the annual Jazz in June Festival in Norman. Mary is active as a community volunteer and has been her Rotary Club's pianist for the last 17 years. In 2004, she became the official accompanist for the International Rotary Assembly held in San Diego.

Mrs. Sallee is active in her local MTA and chairs several state competitions and festivals. Seven years ago, she started the Oklahoma Composition Festival as well as a local composition competition for the Norman MTA. Mary is a past state president of Oklahoma MTA, a MTNA Foundation Fellow and currently serves as an MTNA Director representing the South-Central Division.

Gary Ingle: MTNA CEO and Our IMTF Presenter

The members of NDMTA are honored to have Gary L. Ingle, the Executive Director and CEO of Music Teachers National Association (MTNA), as a guest at this year's NDMTA Conference, to be held in Dickinson, ND on June 18-20, 2014. Dr. Ingle will not only be a guest during the conference, but also will be this year's presenter for the IMTF luncheon. Dr. Ingle is a career professional in association management and academia.

Prior to his December 1996 appointment to MTNA, he was executive director of Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia Music Fraternity in Evansville, Indiana, overseeing the fraternity's work with more than 200 collegiate chapters across the country. Dr. Ingle's academic career spanned 10 years with Southwest Baptist University in Bolivar, Missouri. During his tenure, he attained the rank of full professor of music and served as Chair of the department of music, as Dean of the Casebolt School of Fine Arts, and ultimately as Vice President for Enrollment Management. As a conductor, he directed his choirs on four international tours: to continental Europe, to Great Britain, and two to the Far East. While in Asia, his choirs sang for the Far East Broadcasting Company and in Olympic Stadium in Seoul, South Korea.

A native of Birmingham, Alabama, Dr. Ingle holds the doctor of musical arts degree with emphases in conducting, voice, and higher education administration from the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary in Louisville, Kentucky. He earned Bachelor's and Master's degrees in music at Samford University in Birmingham.

Dr. Ingle is a member of the advisory board of From the Top, the public radio program dedicated to encouraging, supporting and celebrating the commitment of young people to music and the arts. He is also is a member of the editorial advisory board for the magazine, Making Music: Better Living Through Recreational Music Making, a magazine devoted to the health and wellness benefits of music making.

A frequent speaker and panelist, he has given addresses in 44 states as well as to music associations in Canada, the United Kingdom, China, Eastern and Western Europe, and South America, including the International Society for Music Education, the European Music Teachers Association, the International Music Council, the National Association of Schools of Music, NAMM: The International Music Products Association, the College Music Society, Piano Technicians Guild, Canadian Federation of Music Teachers Associations, the Global Summit of the Music Products Industry, the Music Publishers Association, and the Music Council for the Three Americas.

Tom Gerou: 2014 NDMTA Commissioned Composer

Mr. Tom Gerou will be our 2014 NDMTA Commissioned Composer. He is a North Dakota native, graduating from Trinity High School in Dickinson and he is a former student of Priscilla Keogh, a past president of NDMTA. Tom graduated with honors from the University of Southern California, where he received a Bachelor's Degree in composition. He continued his education as a Charles Ditson Scholar at Yale University, receiving his Master's of Music Degree in composition.

Tom Gerou has over 140 publications. He recently co-authored and designed *Great Music and Musicians*, a new series for *Alfred's Premier Piano Course*. He is also known for his *Piece by Piece* series, as well as his solos and recital suites.



Mr. Gerou is the Vice President of Keyboard Production and Director of Keyboard Operations at Alfred's Publishing Company and NDMTA is happy that he will be attending the 2014 NDMTA State Conference to premier his commissioned piece as well as present an Alfred Showcase session!
