Díscovery Corner

Frances Clark once stated that her primary goal as a piano teacher was "...to create a climate in which my students can experience continual musical, intellectual, and emotional growth, and to become increasingly dispensible to them in the process. Everything I do as a teacher, and every other teaching goal I have, relates directly to this first, most basic objective – to help my students grow by and for themselves."ⁱ It is clear from this statement as well as from her piano method *The Music Tree* that she truly believed in learning by personal experience rather than by strictly didactic teaching. This column will provide teachers with ideas for incorporating discovery learning in their studios.

Experiential learning or discovery learning as it applies to the piano studio can be described as "hands on," action-based learning. Elements of music are discovered through the process of experience. The learner may or may not be aware that they are experiencing and discovering, per se. Even though the focus tends to be on the learner, the teacher must also take an active role in the process of experience. For some educators, "experiential learning is not a set of educational methods; it is a statement of fact: People do learn from their experiences."

This concept may seem simplistic, but taking the time to plan discovery learning activities during the lesson is not! Helping students discover things on their own takes time, but it is that "light-bulb" moment that will stick with them and help them to transfer the information learned and apply it to other areas. Here are a few ideas for teaching technique concepts in an experiential way:

Scales: Scale fingering is one of the easiest ways to incorporate discovery learning into the lesson. In my studio, I prefer to teach the B Major scale first because the organization of white and black keys is ideal for students to discover fingering on their own. Given one simple rule, such as no thumbs on black keys, the student will discover that there are only two notes the thumbs are able to play. With the teacher's guidance, the student will come up with the correct fingering for the scale. Now the student is able to transfer this information to two other scales: D-flat Major and G-flat Major. The student is more likely to remember this fingering if they experienced it first, rather than if the teacher directly gave it to her/him.

Pedaling: Introducing pedal to a young student begins with listening. Direct the student to play a few single consonant notes (such as C-E-G) without pedal and then with pedal. No doubt the student has already experimented with the pedal at home! Ask the student to listen to the sound and to describe it as different notes were played as well as experiment with the depth of the pedal. After the student has heard the difference in sound, then discuss the notated pedal sign. Once the student becomes comfortable pushing and releasing the pedal, keeping the heel on the floor, you might discuss the concept of overlapping pedal. This too, is an exercise in listening and can be taught in a similar way.

Articulation: When method books introduce new articulation symbols such as legato, staccato, accents, fermatas, etc., it is important for students to experience these **before** they ever see the symbol for it or know its name. As teachers, it is our responsibility to know the sequencing of the method we are using and be prepared to help students discover new concepts before they actually see them in their book. To introduce legato, have the student think of a short sentence (it could be a summary of the day's activities, something interesting about the student, favorite food: "I like to eat ice cream"). Next have the student speak or sing the sentence (any pitch will do) as smoothly as possible. Transfer the rhythm of the sentence to a 5-finger pattern on the piano, having the student play as smoothly as it was spoken/sung. Once the student has experienced this, then show the sign for this sound and finally the name. The same sentence can also be used to discover staccato sounds, accents and fermatas.

Keep in mind there must also be a balance between guiding discovery learning and didactic teaching. Both styles are necessary in order to have an adequate learning environment for the student. Three Sessions with Robert Vandall By Beth Klingenstein

It was such a treat to meet and listen to the ideas of Robert Vandall, our 2007 Conference Clinician. Mr. Vandall is a renowned composer who considers himself a teacher first and a composer second. Vandall and his wife, Karen, teach 90 students in their independent studio in New Philadelphia, Ohio.

Mr. Vandall educated us with three sessions. The first session was "Making Music: Helping the Student Make a Piece Come Alive!" He explained that he and his students find what's interesting in a piece and then they make it come alive. He talked about phrasing, using non-musical words like "hang and drop" for a half-note, quarter, quarter rhythm and "so there" for a V-I chord progression, and he encourages his students to look at the words in a piece to determine where the emphasis should go when creating phrases. For example with, "It's a rainy day" from the piece "The Rainbow Song", one could emphasize the word "rainy" by building to "rainy" and then dying away to "day". There were many combinations that could be done with that one little statement. He welcomes changing phrasing and sometimes even a note or two in a piece so that things make more sense to him. He believes that we should "own the piece" by interpreting it our own way.

The second session was "Memorizing: It Takes More Than Muscles". He listed three reasons why a student may have problems when performing: 1) lack of concentration 2) lack of preparation 3) distractions. Vandall listed types of memorizing: 1) tactile 2) aural 3) visual 4) analytical. He said it's best to use a combination of all of these to learn and memorize a piece thoroughly. He then gave a list of activities to do with students to help them see logical patterns: 1) alternate playing phrases with the teacher 2) play with one hand and tap with the other hand, then switch 3) the teacher plays melody and the student plays chords, then switch 4) label sections of the piece or make charts with symbols to depict the piece 5) give them many opportunities to play for memory.

The third and final session was "Composition: A View From the Inside". Vandall shared that he didn't start composing until his 30's. He tried many different companies and liked how he was treated at Myklas Music Press. Alfred's then bought out Myklas and he continues to write for them today. He has written almost 400 pieces and he shared his personal methods for composing for students: 1) he tries to make the music sound difficult but it's not 2) it must feel right in his hands 3) he thinks about the level of students he's writing for 4) he follows the space on the page, how many measures does he need 5) he gets ideas from his students, titles, nature, teachers, history, Alfred's and he listens to all styles of music with the exception of "rap" 6) he writes in the mornings and teaches in the afternoons 7) he hates coming up with titles and will often lie on the floor with a thesaurus for ideas 8) he likes other modes instead of the usual major and minor keys.

He concluded the last session by sifting through the many pieces he has written and

North Dakota Music Teachers Association Video Conference Board Meeting

January 20th, 2007

President Corinne Nustad called the meeting to order.

Linda Hanson-Bell made a motion to adopt the agenda and Michelle Heaford seconded. All voted in favor and the motion passed.

Secretary's Report: Michelle Heaford had sent the minutes to the board members via email. The minutes were approved as read in advance.

Treasurer's Report: Anne Delorme-Holmen reported a checking balance of \$12,251.38 and a money market savings balance of \$4,922.46. The Treasurer's report was approved and filed for audit.

Vice President/Competitions: Arlene Gray reported on recent work in preparation for West Central Division Competitions. She mentioned the importance of encouraging ND teachers to enter students in state and national competitions.

President: President Corinne Nustad had sent her report via email. Details from her notes are available as comments through-out the report and in the "old and new business" section.

Committee Reports:

Advertising: Linda Hanson-Bell reported communication with advertisers and the receipt of 48 ads which totaled \$3,290.00. She also suggested that we change the name of "Advertising Editor" to "Advertising Coordinator".

Darla Sheldon made a motion to change the name of "Advertising Editor" to Advertising Coordinator" Anne Delorme-Holmen seconded. All voted in favor and the motion passed. *Certification:* Gloria Bethke stated that she will be sending "Teacher of the Year" application forms to each local association encouraging them to nominate a teacher from their association.
