As we progress through the academic year, it's essential to keep our students engaged and motivated, especially in the midst of colder and darker days. To this end, I'd like to offer some heartwarming tips that can infuse our music studios with inspiration and enthusiasm:

- Winter Wonderland Repertoire: Embrace the beauty of the winter season by introducing a selection of winter-themed music into your repertoire.



Dr. Robert Groves has been a member of the North Dakota State University faculty since 1972. His graduate degrees were completed at the University of Iowa, and his principal piano teachers were Arthur Lambert and John Simms with additional study with Joanna Graudan and Vitya Veronsky. His teaching specialties are studio piano, piano pedagogy, chamber music, and music history. He also maintains a private studio of pre-college age piano students ranging in age from early elementary school through late high school. He retired from full-time teaching at the NDSU in 2020 and now teaches 4-6 undergraduate and graduate piano majors and music history courses.



As a member of the piano faculty at NDSU, Dr. Groves has been an active performer, clinician, adjudicator, and author for 50 years. These include serving as coordinator of piano studies at the International Music Camp for over 25 years, numerous lecture/performances through the North Dakota Humanities Council and the Institute for Regional Studies, summer piano teacher workshops, and guest appearances for many of the regional music teacher associations. A number of his university as well as pre-college piano students have been finalists or winners of piano competitions. His approach to teaching piano pedagogy is based on the concept of "applied" pedagogy, in which he places particular focus on helping identify solutions to specific playing challenges (technical, musical, performance-oriented, etc.) commonly encountered by piano students. Dr. Groves also has been highly successful in helping pianists at all playing levels to understand and eventually eliminate recurring tendonitis in their playing. In 2017 he completed a book on the history of music at NDSU (Music at NDSU) published by the NDSU Press, and in 2018 was recognized for his "Service to the Profession" at the NDMTA state meeting.

As of September 6, \$1,294.50 has been contributed.

President Tamara Bertram called the meeting to order. Roll call: Vangie Johnson Parker, Tamara Bertram, Dianna Anderson, Sue Nagel, Lisa Schuler, Kathleen Johnson, Michelle Kallod, Anne Morris, Sheryl Kjelland.

Officers' Reports

Secretary: Minutes were approved.

Treasurer: Michelle Kallod submitted Treasurer's Report. Checking account balance \$25,209.06. Savings account balance \$15,217.96. Certificate of Deposit \$10,658.89

Vice-President/Commissioned Composer Lisa Schuler reported the following:

- Completed final details with MTNA for the 2023 Commissioned Composer Lisa Bost-Sandberg, a flute professor at UND. Her scores and recordings were submitted for the Distinguished Composer Award.
- Extended an invitation to Isaac Lovdahl from UND to be our 2024 Commissioned Composer and he has excitedly accepted. His contract has been signed by MTNA, Isaac, Tamara and Lisa.
- Presented a proposal to Josh Gratton, owner of Popplers Music Store in Grand Forks, to host the 2024 NDMTA State Conference in conjunction with their annual piano clinic. Accepted!
- Attended a WCD meeting to review parliamentary procedures.
- Reached out to composer Wendy Stevens about the possibility of having her as conference clinician in the future – possibly 2025.

President: Tamara Bertram reported the following:

- She wrote letters for NDMTA Newsletter and NDMTA Directory
- She corresponded with Mary Beth Shaffer/ West Central Division
- She attended website meeting.
- She attended the national MTNA Local Presidents Meeting

Committees

Advertising: Anne Morris has sold \$1,575 in ads. She has received \$1,250 in advertising money and is waiting to receive the remaining \$325. It has been a challenging process this year and she is thinking of new strategies to attract new advertisers.

Competitions: Sue Nagel reported that the state competition will be held at VCSU on October 28, 2023. There will be 2 SR and 3 YA woodwinds competing. Dr. Cassie Keogh will be adjudicator and Dr. Oswald Johnson from VCSU will provide written comments for SR composition and YA pianists. Sue Nagel wants to be done with this job and pass it on to someone else. President Tamara will contact John Clodfetter about taking over this position. Sue Nagel will ask Oswald Johnson if he would take over this position.

Directory: Michelle Schumacher reported that she is working to complete the Directory and wants to know how many members would like to receive the Directory virtually this year.

Foundation: Dianna Anderson asked that members donate to Foundation Fellow in honor of Robert Groves. As of September 6, 2023 we have \$1294.50 so we are getting close to the necessary \$1500. We need to name a new person for next year's Foundation Fellow nominee. Dianna has asked for nominations,

but now wants to ask for a paragraph of recommendation from people who are suggested nominees. Vangie Johnson Parker requested that the next Foundation Fellow nomination be sent out as soon as possible so that we can start raising that money sooner.

At NDMTA State Conference all Foundation checks should go to the Foundation Chair. If there is cash involved the Foundation Chair and the Treasurer will meet and the Treasurer will write a check to MTNA Foundation and the Foundation Chair will mail them in.

Membership: Corinne Nustad was unable to be at the meeting, but is doing what she can to encourage membership.

Newsletter: Due date for articles for the next newsletter is November 5. Please submit any items of interest to Michelle Kallod for the November newsletter.

Popplers Competition: This competition will be August 7, 2024 in Grand Forks.

Rally: New Rally will soon come from Illinois and will be distributed. FMMTA has their Rally scheduled for April 13, 2024.

Technology: Kathleen Johnson reported that we will cut ties with Handmade Designs and have begun a contract with Bluestem Media to design a new website. Work is in progress. Timeline for completion is the first week in November. Each member should create their own password for the secure parts of the website. Kathleen is working on the History section of the website. Teacher Resource Links and News Highlights will be eliminated.

Badlands MTA hosted Dr. Robert Groves for a Workshop from 9:00 am to noon on Saturday, October 14, 2023 at Our Saviour's Lutheran Church in Dickinson, ND. Dr Groves is a Professor and member of the piano faculty at NDSU, Fargo.

Dr. Groves presented the topics "Teaching the Beginning Student" and "How to Make the Transition from Method Books to Intermediate Literature". Some of his tips for beginning piano students included the following:

- □ Be mindful of student's position on the bench.
 - They often sit too close to the piano, which can be caused by their feet dangling. The suggestion was made to have students sit on books to obtain the proper height in relation to the keys and to have their feet on a box.
 - Ideally, their arm "floats out from the elbow and is slightly in front of the stomach". If their elbows are locked, the result is arm muscles twisting in order for the hands to be on the keyboard.

He presented the following repertoire collections and anthologies that he most often turns to for students nearing the end or following their method book experience. Groves stated in his handout, "I find these anthologies include very little to none of the obscure "filler" repertoire that no one ever plays. Upon request I will put together a list of the titles I tend to most often select for my students within a specific anthology."
